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


While we started with a style of bringing the classroom into our home, I gradually realized there was so much more to our day than adding and phonics. I started to recognize that I was trying to implement teaching all the subjects at a specific grade level to each of them. Did they do this worksheet of math facts? Did they sound out these short vowels five times this morning? Do they have all the mountain ranges and rivers memorized? That is how the school system operates mainly because one teacher is in charge of educating twenty-five plus kids. There needs to be a system in place to create order, but that doesn't mean it is the best method of learning. I was beginning to understand that I needed to unlearn from my years in the educational system in order to best help my children learn all that God had for them. This was a process. It can look different for different families, in different seasons and with different personalities/learning styles. I decided to call up all the friends I knew that homeschooled and ask them what their favorite resources were and why . . . Then it hit me, "God, these are YOUR children. You have a perfect plan for their lives. You have created them and designed their gifts and talents for Your glory. Show me Lord, how best to raise them in a way that helps them reach their goals that You have planned for them." With that prayer, things changed.



I sat down with my husband and talked about what our end goals were for raising these children we were blessed with. We gathered our kids together to share with them our new, focused thoughts. We desired for them to love the Lord with all their hearts, minds and souls, and to love others well. We wanted to create in them a lifetime love of learning, of discovering this amazing world God created. We wanted to equip them with the tools of knowing how to learn something or how to find out the information that they needed. If they had a desire to always grow in their knowledge and sought the wisdom from God on how to apply that knowledge, then the rest of "schooling" would look very different.



My older two children are eighteen months apart, which allowed me to combine most of their subjects. With the exception of math and what I required from the older one with writing, we started learning together. This was the game changer. This is where my "unlearning" made room for learning. We let our conversations guide us into hours of applying biblical truths to all areas of history, literature, character development, science, life skills and personal lessons. As I let go of what I thought had to be accomplished in an eight hour period and let God be my teacher, He then instructed me on how to specifically guide these little people He had entrusted to us. This new way of learning led us to understand how every discovery was threading all of God's world together. Excitement grew! Their hunger and opinions started to be articulated in ways that they began to identify in themselves some of their unique giftings and interests. With the new freedom of discovery as the method of learning, each child began to shine as they headed down a path of exploration.

There are the mountain top moments of excitement and then there are valleys of trudging through the muck . . . but this too, is learning. Teaching our children how to do the mundane with joy and grateful hearts is just as important as learning how to add, multiply and read. Likewise, there is great value and reward in pushing through the difficult and unknown. Just because it's hard, doesn't mean we avoid it. Instructing through example and modeling desired behavior is equally valuable.





As my older children have grown through the freedom of learning, my husband and I have been amazed by how their natural talents have surfaced. As they entered the early teen years, each one started a more purposeful, direct shift towards the bent that God had designed for them. They had the time and courage to try things they thought might interest them. They researched and created. They failed and they grew. With all the experience came an excitement to try more, to stretch their abilities and discover new ones. This is the fruit we are blessed to witness. There is great joy in watching your children learn, discover, create and serve.



We adopted our youngest son when he was five. I was so excited to start his education with a different mindset, implementing all that I had learned with the older two. This truth still applies. So I lean on God, ebb and flow with how our family rhythm is for the season. Keeping all the foundational goals in mind, we learn together.
